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Overview of the Catalogue:

This document has been created to support those seeking to access Short Breaks, Alternative Provision, Early Intervention and Holiday Activities and Food Programme provision. This catalogue has been created to provide more information on the types of activity available and those providers who are currently delivering within Swindon Borough Council.

Within each page you will find some brief information about what each provider is able to offer, as well as where they are located, when they operate, and how you can contact them for more information.

Overview of Short Breaks:

Short Breaks give children and young people with disabilities opportunities to have fun, share experiences and socialise away from their family, whilst giving their parents and carers a break from their caring responsibilities.

In Swindon, we recognise that all children and families are different and may require different types and levels of Short Breaks support. We aim to ensure that children and young people with disabilities and their families receive the right short breaks at the right time.

There are three types of short breaks available for children and young people (aged 0 to their eighteenth birthday) who are Swindon residents and have a disability (as defined by the Equality Act 2010):

- Community groups and activities
- Inclusion funding
- Specialist groups and activities

Overview of Early Intervention:

Early intervention is a form of support aimed at improving outcomes for children or preventing escalating need or risk. In Swindon, it is a term used for all services that work together to deliver early help to families. The Early Intervention approach is a graduated and proportionate response to need that focuses on “whole family” support, providing help as needs emerge so that families are supported to become resilient and the challenges they face do not escalate unnecessarily.

Early intervention focuses on identifying and addressing developmental, behavioural, emotional, and educational challenges at the earliest possible stage.

Early intervention may be offered in a wide range of situations within a family in which a child’s health or wellbeing could be affected.

For instance, you may receive support if your child:

- has disabilities, special educational needs (SEND) or long-term physical health issues
- has mild or emerging mental health difficulties
- is being bullied or bullying others
- faces challenges at home, such as difficult relationships, domestic abuse, parental alcohol or drug misuse, parental or sibling mental or physical health problems
- is a young carer or a young parent
- is in private foster care or returning home after being in care

The main objectives of early intervention are to improve outcomes for children by preventing issues from escalating, enhancing developmental milestones, and supporting emotional and educational growth.



Overview of Holiday Activities and Food (HAF):

The Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme provides healthy meals, enriching activities, and free childcare places to children from low-income families, benefiting their health, wellbeing and learning.

Since 2022, the HAF programme has provided 10.7 million HAF days to children and young people in this country. The expansion of the programme year-on-year has meant a total of 5.4 million HAF days provided between Winter 2022, Easter and Summer 2023.

The programme is aimed at children in receipt of benefits related free school meals (FSM) and each session runs for 4 hours.

There are many benefits for children who attend the HAF programme. We want to encourage all HAF providers to ensure a high-quality experience that will result in children:

- receiving healthy and nutritious meals
- maintaining a healthy level of physical activity
- being happy, having fun and meeting new friends
- developing a greater understanding of food, nutrition and other health related issues
- taking part in fun and engaging activities that support their development and well-being
- feeling safe and secure
- getting access to the right support services
- returning to school feeling engaged and ready to learn

HAF delivery runs during:

- Easter term holiday (4 days minimum)
- Summer term holiday (16 days minimum)
- Winter term holiday (4 days minimum)

Overview of Alternative Provision:

Alternative Provision helps to support children and young people who are unable to access full-time mainstream education for a variety of reasons, such as behavioural or health needs. The main aim of Alternative Provision is to equip children and young people with a range of skills to support their transition back in to full-time education; whether that is remaining in their mainstream setting or moving on to a specialist placement.

Each provider offers a different approach towards education with many embedding learning by focussing on a specific area of interest. Alongside developing lifelong skills, Alternative Provision also promotes holistic and emotional development to help children and young people develop the skills needed to tackle challenges and setbacks. Some Alternative Provisions offer full-time support for a set period of time, while others offer a set number of hours to help a child or young person achieve a specific target or goal. The level of support offered to a child or young person is usually determined after an initial consultation. As Alternative Provisions often charge for their service, each provider has a different approach to funding. The cost for accessing the service is usually decided once the level of support is outlined.

In order to access Alternative Provision, a referral is often required. Individuals wishing to seek Alternative Provision can usually be referred in to the service by a professional known to the child, such as an EHCP coordinator, through the Local Authority or through a Social Worker.

Description of the Provision:

Academy21 is the UK's leading live online alternative provision specialist, accredited by the DfE through the [Online Education Accreditation Scheme \(OEAS\)](#). Learners remain on their school roll and can access lessons from any location including school, a learning centre, home or out in the community. The programme is adaptable and inclusive, working with learners with Tier 2 and 3 support needs, as well as those with behavioural, medical or mental health needs. The support offered helps to prepare learners to transition back into mainstream education or prepare them for the world of work.

Sessions are delivered during term time and learners have access to a range of support during each session. Alongside weekly lessons, students also have access to one-to-one support tutorials and an optional weekly consolidation lesson to address any gaps or missed learning from the week. All lessons are recorded and are available outside of the structured sessions to promote independence and an opportunity to revisit learning.

Each lesson is delivered by a fully qualified subject specialist, and the teachers work with the same groups of learners so that relationships are built and maintained. Teachers are flexible in their approach and adapt their learning to suit the needs of the learners. There is a focus on pastoral support, academic challenge and educational engagement.

The courses provide the opportunity for pupils to achieve nationally recognised GCSEs and Functional Skills qualifications. Courses that learners can participate in include English, Maths, Science, Humanities & Citizenship, ICT, PSHE, Geography and History. There are additional courses available for learners in Key Stage 5 (AS Level and A-Level).

Academy21 streamlines the enrolment process for schools and local authorities, enabling them to support learners precisely when they need it. With the capability to enrol students in as little as two working days, Academy21 accepts referrals throughout the academic year.

The service only accepts referrals from Schools, Education Organisations, and Local Authorities. Upon contacting them, a dedicated Partnership Manager (PM) will delve into the referral and learner's needs. The information from the enrolment form allows for a personalised curriculum and timetable to be produced, focusing on 'Right Support, Right Place, Right Time' provision.

Description of the Provision:

Ackerman Pierce has over 5 years' experience within Alternative Provision and working in partnership with their students, families. Their aim is to ensure excellent outcomes for the students who have access to their provision: including those with SEND/ADHD/ASD/SEMH needs, school refusers, complex needs and disabilities.

Ackerman Pierce provision teams are location specific and dedicated to understanding their tutor's and client's needs. They provide individual and tailored tuition specific to every child's unique circumstance, putting in place the essential first building blocks to ensure positive outcomes are achieved. Their tutors aim to make learning fun, engaging and relatable - they get to know their students focusing on establishing rapport and trust, becoming aware of the student's interests/motivations/ambitions, so they can adapt/build lesson plans that encourage engagement.

Ackerman Pierce provide up to 15 hours 1:1 outreach tuition per week per child utilising the family home or community setting following instruction from the Local Authority. They focus on KS1-5 and GCSE core subject delivery, functional skills and mentoring. Assisting in preparation for SATs/GCSEs/entry level exams helping students improve their chances of academic success, with a focus on next steps and positive outcomes dependant on the student's needs. They also support with life skills/communication/interaction/cognition and learning, social/emotional/mental health in line with pupils' specific needs/EHCP, thematic approach, relationships, health and wellbeing and living in the wider world.

Description of the Provision:

Apricot Learning Online provides online tuition to children and young people who are facing a range of barriers in accessing mainstream education. The provision has four key aims:

- Reengagement with learning – helping students to find motivation and enthusiasm for learning after a period of disengagement.
- Recognition of self-work – supporting the development of confidence and self-belief through supportive lessons and guidance.
- Reintegration to school, where possible – address the underlying concerns and begin the reintegration process of returning to school to support the learner’s academic and social-wellbeing.
- Replacement of school, where necessary – helping a student to find a new school if they are not able to remain in their current provision.

Apricot Learning follows the National Curriculum and addresses prior learning to close any gaps in knowledge that the learner may have. The staff implement a wide range of learning strategies to support individuals but also encourage them to take responsibility and ownership of their own learning. Providing support in this way helps students to recognise and celebrate their own talents and successes.

Students have access to a range of subjects and each lesson is recorded for catch-up and revision sessions. Alongside being recorded, each class is interactive to meet the needs and interests of the learner.

Description of the Provision:

BASIS – ARC (Aspire, Restore, Celebrate) provides support for any child or young person with social, communication and interaction difficulties, as well as those that may need extra support with emotional regulation. The service is inclusive and works with children from a range of backgrounds, including those with Tier 2 support needs. Support can be delivered on site at Headlands or at the school of the child or young person. If it is deemed appropriate, the support can also be delivered in a different area to help the child or young person achieve the outcomes that were agreed upon.

ARC works with children and young people who may face challenges in mainstream provision, including those at risk of exclusion. The aim of the service is to support schools in meeting the needs of the child or young person. The service focuses on the individual’s strengths to help raise their aspirations and to encourage them to reach their full potential.

Some areas of holistic development that ARC work with include:

- Management of anxiety
- Support with transitions or re-integration to mainstream provision.
- Support for an EHCP (Educational Health Care Plan) outcome
- Support for those who get overwhelmed in busy environments.
- Emotional Literacy support.
- Support with social and communication skills.
- Specialist support of early communication skills.

Since April 2023, Brunel Education has delivered Short Breaks (taking over from Uplands Educational Trust, who had delivered the service from September 2020 to March 2023) as a service commissioned by Swindon Borough Council to provide after school, weekend and holiday leisure sessions for children and young people. Short Breaks is a premise-based scheme to support children and young people living in Swindon aged 5-18 with additional needs, including but not limited to:

- Children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND)
- Disabled Children
- Children accessing Swindon Borough Council’s Aiming High service



The provision is delivered in a variety of ways dependent on the child/young person and their needs. The service also provides transport to those who require support with attending. Children are supported within sessions on a staffing ratio that is appropriate for their needs and is consistent with supporting funding arrangements children receive in their schools.

After school sessions are run: Monday to Thursday evenings during term time, weekend sessions and school holidays. Whilst at Short Breaks children and young people have access to a range of engaging activities. This includes:

- Sports
- Life skills
- Arts, craft and design
- Sensory activities
- Drama, dance and music
- Singing and story activities

Children also have access to a safe, enclosed outdoor space with a range of play equipment and to an indoor soft play area. Opportunities are taken to support and develop children’s communication and interaction skills, independence and life skills.

Description of the Provision:

BEST- Be A Better You is a sports-based programme offering one-to-one mentoring and sports enrichment sessions for children and young people from all backgrounds and abilities. The sessions are delivered by skilled and understanding mentors and sports coaches, who can adapt sessions for individuals with Tier 1-4 support needs.

BEST – Be A Better You is open Monday-Fridays 9am-5pm and runs a Youth Club on Wednesday evenings from 5pm-8pm. The service offers three types of programme:

- Early Intervention – Sports based one-to-one mentoring and sports enrichment sessions.
- Alternative Provision – Sports based one-to-one mentoring, sports enrichment sessions, tutoring and youth clubs, bespoke, targeted group work sessions.
- Holiday Activities and Food– Sports based small group activities (including boxing, martial arts and football), holiday activities, cooking, arts & craft and well-being sessions.

The one-to-one mentoring sessions can take place on site or in the community. They also provide timetabled enrichment sessions on site and in schools. The alternative provision service offers the AQA Unit Awards Scheme. The length of time that an individual can attend the service depends on individual need and funding.

BEST – Be A Better You believe in a multi-agency approach and works with local authorities, schools and colleges to provide services for children and young people. Parents and stakeholders can refer directly into to the service though the website.

The service aims to support learners to increase their confidence and emotional resilience, while also promoting positive relationships with other members of the local community.

Staff have a range of qualifications, including Level 3 Safeguarding Training, Prevent Training, First Aid Training, Mental Health First Aid Training, Level 2 England Boxing Coaches, Level 1&2 FA Football Coaches and Level 3 Personal Trainers.

Description of the Provision:

Blue Sky Learning was founded as an alternative educational pathway for students who find mainstream education challenging due to their social, emotional and mental health needs. They believe in giving students a bespoke, kinaesthetic approach to enable them to access learning at their own pace and achieve success.

Blue Sky Learning strive to support students and to prepare them for the future by providing the framework of the core values, skills and knowledge that they will need to grow both socially and individually into further education and adulthood.

They endeavour to promote positive behaviours and provide support for young people with behavioural, emotional and social difficulties, so they feel inspired and valued to transition into adulthood ensuring lifelong learning continues and is habitual. Blue Sky Learning strives to help students develop into mature, successful young adults, who are supported by staff.

In the past 6 years, they have helped approximately 65% of students return to their mainstream school. For those unable to return, Blue Sky Learning have supported individuals in getting ready and in a better place to move onto their next provision.

All activities are prepared and administered in a way that each student can access them and find success no matter what their ability is. Staff use praise and proximal praise to boost a student's self-esteem and give them confidence in themselves. Staff are aware of students' particular triggers and take these into account when planning each session.

Blue Sky Learning prides itself on delivering bespoke curriculums, tailor-made to each individual student to include likes and avoid dislikes. Students are offered a varied range of activities to promote and engage them in learning and so they can regain a love for education.

Description of the Provision:

Oxenwood Outdoor Education Centre and Linkenholt Countryside Adventure Centre supports children and young people from all backgrounds, including those who struggle to access mainstream education and those who find maintaining social relationships challenging. They work with individuals with support needs in Tiers 1-3 and each session can be delivered in a 1:1 or small group setting.

Children are encouraged to connect with nature and embark on a range of adventures to help them develop their confidence, resilience, independence and motivation. The curriculum focuses on children and young people's social, emotional and physical development.

Some of the activities that children and young people can participate in, include:

- Bush Craft and Survival, such as emergency survival skills, shelter building, navigation, campfire cooking, water purification and basic emergency first aid.
- Discover History, such as Stone Age Life, Ancient Britons, Knights & Castles and Romans, Saxons & Vikings.
- Outdoor Adventurer, such as climbing, mountain biking and hiking & navigation.

Each of these sessions encourage physical activity and social interaction by supporting children and young people to overcome their fears and face challenges with confidence. Each session also supports children and young people in developing their coordination, problem solving and teamwork skills. The service encourages the children and young people to think about the nature around them to develop their environmental awareness skills.

Description of the Provision:

Connex Alternative Provision offers a bespoke curriculum for children and young people of primary and secondary age. The curriculum is designed to support individual children and young people, building on their interests and needs to help them reach their full potential. The service is inclusive and works with children with support needs in Tiers 1-3.

The provision specialises in supporting children who have a barrier to accessing and engaging with education. Working alongside the child or young person, their families and the schools, the service can be delivered within the home, online, in the local community or on-site. Description of the Provision:

Greatwood Charity is a service that provides short courses for Primary, Secondary and NEET (not in employment, education or training) students with support needs in Tiers 2 and 3. The provision supports individuals to develop their emotional literacy, resilience and self-regulation skills, while also learning about animal care, primarily caring for the rescued and retired racehorses.

Children and young people are referred into the service by commissioning schools, parents, carers and other agencies. For primary aged KS1 and KS2 pupils, learners referred by schools can participate in Horse Power™ group courses. Alternatively, one to one provision, Horse Power Plus™, is available to all individuals. Both are 6-week programmes that can support the transition back into mainstream education. Links are made to the National Curriculum while focussing on the development of emotional literacy. Beyond an initial six weeks, Horse Power Extra™ further develops the skills learnt during Horse Power Plus™. For longer term placements, Greatwood work closely with commissioners on targets to help plan provision that is appropriate and effective for the learner.

KS3 and KS4 pupils can work towards NOCN accredited Level 1 Qualifications, Developing Confidence Working with Animals (worth 3 credits), Interpersonal Skills (worth 3 credits) and Assisting the Care of animals (worth 2 credits). Each of these courses is individually certificated by NOCN, but pupils who stay with Greatwood for longer periods and gain 6 Level 1 credits achieve a Level 1 Award in Skills for Employment, Training and Personal Development. Pupils completing these courses can develop their confidence while working with thoroughbred horses and a variety of small animals. As part of the courses, learners will follow health and safety rules, develop their understanding of the natural behaviour of animals and can develop their communication and team-working skills.

KS3 and KS4 pupils also study for, and take exams in, English and Maths Functional Skills, accredited by NOCN.

Learners with a particular interest in the equine industry can complete further training and qualifications, such as a nationally recognised, accredited by 1st4Sport, Entry 2 qualification in Assisting with Basic Horse Care aimed at young people who wish to progress into a career within the horse racing industry.

The teaching team at Greatwood are highly experienced qualified teachers and the Head of Education is also a qualified SENCO. Greatwood's Teaching Assistant has a Diploma in Special Educational Needs and has a Certificate in Assessing Vocational Achievement.

Description of the Provision:

Rebel Training Group LTD provides a range of activities for children and young people aged between 4 and 21, including those with support needs in Tiers 1-4.

The Early Intervention Nurture Programme offers a bespoke support package tailored to the unique needs of each young person. Grounded in attachment theory and neuroscience, this nationally recognised intervention prioritises the emotional wellbeing and mental health of children, particularly those who have experienced trauma, neglect, or other adverse childhood experiences (ACEs).

The programme provides early help assessments and art-based nurture groups delivered as weekly, offsite school interventions. An assessment is undertaken, helping to identify and plan for learners' social, emotional, and behavioural needs. Strategies are then shared with schools to ensure effective inclusion and support within the classroom environment

Rein and Shine helps children and young people to connect to their communities through working with horses. They specialise in supporting children and young people who may be disengaged with education, those with additional special educational needs and those with Tier 4 support needs that may benefit from access to an alternative provision pathway.

The alternative provision service is based within an equine setting and works with children and young people to help them transition back into a school or college environment or to help prepare them for entering the world of work.

The staff that work at Rein and Shine are all qualified and experienced BHS Accredited Professional Coaches, while children and young people will also access support from specialist high and complex need teachers.

The programme makes links to the National Curriculum but focuses on promoting holistic development, to build relationships, communication, confidence, responsibility, teamwork and perseverance.

Outdoor learning, with the therapeutic benefit of horses, helps to create an environment in which children and young people can learn. The pathway is bespoke and can be fully adapted to suit the needs and interests of the child and young person.

Description of the Provision:

Seedlings offers part-time placements (two or three days a week) for children aged between 4 and 7, who are on the role of a mainstream school within Swindon but are struggling to make progress or engage with their learning in this environment. The service works with children from a range of backgrounds, including those with Tier 3 support needs.

Following the Gradual Steps or an Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) Curriculum, Seedlings focuses on five key areas:

- Communication and Language
- Physical Development
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

Maths and English is also built into the curriculum to support and consolidate the content being delivered by the mainstream school. Seedlings also works with schools, parents and carers and Speech and Language Therapists (SALT) to help develop children's communication and interaction skills. Seedlings students are introduced to a Total Communication approach to learning, using signing, object reference, symbols and communication boards/ aids.

Children are encouraged to learn through play and through the use of a sensory-based curriculum. Children are encouraged to learn to regulate their emotions and physical selves through a variety of sensory based activities. Some activities might include: Sensology, Attention Bucket, baking, dance sessions, music, sensory stories, Time to Talk Sessions and fine motor activities. They also have access to a large, safe, outdoor and indoor environment with climbing equipment, slides and soft play and a sensory Cabin.



The purpose of this placement is to help children succeed within a mainstream school environment. If this is not possible, staff at Seedlings can contribute towards the review of an Educational Health Care Plan (EHCP) and provide additional support while a specialist placement is being sought. The purpose of a Seedlings placement is to aid children in developing strategies that will enable them to cope better within their mainstream environment or to provide additional support whilst a specialist placement is being sought.

Staff are trained at level 2-5 of Early Years and or SEND. Staff are also trained in:

- Singalong
- Team Teach
- Sensory Awareness
- All mandatory Safeguarding training
- Paediatric First aid

To apply for a placement at Seedlings, SENCO's will need to discuss with their EHCP coordinators, who will then follow the LA consultation process. Students can attend on a 2-day placement. This is usually on a 12-month basis. All Sessions are face to face and run at a 1:2 basis unless agreed with the LA. Class size is a maximum of 8 children.

Description of the Provision:

Swindon Mentoring and Self Help (SMASH) Project has over 25 years of experience delivering impactful, evidence-based services that support children and young people (CYP) re-engage with education and training in a psychologically safe, sustainable way, improving long term outcomes for the individual. SMASH offer a range of projects and services for individuals to engage with:

- **Wellbeing Mentoring** - provides one-to-one mentoring for CYP with emerging risks to their mental health and wellbeing.
- **Emotionally Based Schools Non-Attendance (EBSNA)** - offers personalised mentoring to 9 to 16-year-olds, to positively challenge and address barriers faced when accessing education. SMASH mentors will work alongside the young person, the home community, and the educational provision to foster solutions that work for the young person.
- **Transitions for Young People** - this takes a relational, peer-led approach to mentoring, encouraging Year 10 students to mentor Year 6s as they transition from primary into secondary school. This project aims to reduce the potential nerves and anxiety of Year 6s moving into secondary school, building their resilience to face new challenges. In return, the Year 10s are offered the opportunity of peer-based mentoring, enabling students to take the lead and develop their interpersonal and leadership skills.
- **Empower and Engage** - offers 1-to-1 mentoring to female students in Year 11 who are on a reduced timetable, enabling them to develop essential skills, explore career options, and adapt to the demands of college life. The project aims to create a structured and supportive environment for young women, providing a space where they can explore their options, develop ambitions and, hopefully, increase their engagement with education.
- **Hospital Youth Work**, in partnership with NHS and VCSE providers, supports CYP aged 11-25 with long term health conditions who frequently attend hospital and/or A&E to access the community and take control of their health and wellbeing.

SMASH also offers further services for communities and youth groups, which support young people to be an active part of their community, as well as empowering young people to explore the world of work and possible employment opportunities:



- **Solid Ground Coffee** - practical hub for young people with experience of serious violence to learn new skills and access the community. Situated on site outside the Swindon Borough Council Offices, young people will also be able to build relationships with key decision makers. This programme supports young people directly involved with Youth Justice to build their confidence, develop their employability skills and integrate into the community.
- **Transitioning out of the Care System** - working in partnership with CCLA and Wiltshire Community Foundation, this project supports young people who are transitioning out of the care system. Offering a long-term, tailored relationship, our mentors work 1-to-1 with young people across Wiltshire and Swindon, helping them navigate barriers into work and everyday life. Much like the Hospital project, our trauma-informed community-based mentors support young people to develop the skills and discover or realise their ambitions. This project works with young people aged 17 to 25 years.
- **Safer Relationships, Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG)** - a school based self-referral group mentoring program, empowering young women in education to discuss and recognise unsafe behaviours in friendships and relationships. Through a collaborative, female lead programme, students are encouraged to explore topics in a psychologically safe group environment. VAWG works with young women between the ages 11 to 16 in school, running 1.5 hour group sessions for a period of 12 weeks. Topics covered by the group are relative and appropriate to the age group they are working with.

Pupils who attend Sophia High School study a curriculum, built around the English national curriculum, that has been carefully adjusted to take account of the global context in which Sophia High School operates. Description of the Provision:

Sounds Like Women CIC provides music therapy and therapeutic sessions for children and young people from a range of backgrounds, including those with Tier 1-4 support needs.

Children and young people accessing the service can either receive support within their own homes, at a chosen venue or at The Baker’s Café in Swindon, where group sessions are delivered on a weekly basis. Online music therapy services can also be offered to individuals who are unable to attend an in-person session. Sessions can be delivered on a 1:1 basis or in a small group, depending on the needs of the individual.

Children and young people are referred into the service by their schools, the Local Authority or a referral from families or relatives. Individuals can use the service for as long as is needed.

Staff have a range of qualifications including a Masters in Music Psychotherapy, a Masters in Art Therapy, a Masters in Drama Therapy, Safeguarding qualifications and Counselling qualifications.

- Healthy Lifestyle: Encouraging regular exercise and a balanced diet to support physical well-being.
- Mental Health: Developing positive coping strategies and fostering a growth mindset.

- Subject-specific work provided by their main school placement.
- Activities to rebuild relationships with their main school or a potential new placement.
- Continued mentoring support after their placement ends.
- Transport to and from the location.
- Nutritious lunches aligned with a healthy lifestyle.

The Alternative Provision aims to provide a nurturing environment where students can rediscover their confidence, develop essential skills, and achieve meaningful progress in their educational journey. Stride360 remains committed to fostering positive change in the lives of children and young people, empowering them to overcome challenges and reach their full potential.

A qualified designated safeguarding lead and a qualified Teacher will also be appointed to write, review and deliver the curriculum.

Individuals can be referred by Schools, Local Authority and by Parents. Referrals can be made via the website or by email.

Students can access 1:1 mentoring, group mentoring and onsite support for a minimum of 12 weeks. For the Alternative Provision students will be placed with us for 12 weeks with the intention of re-integrating them into their main school placement. Placements will be reviewed every 12 weeks with the school or council to decide if the placement continues. There is no cap on the length of time a student can spend at the Alternative Provision.

Swindon Tuition Centre provides alternative provision and HAF support for children and young people between the ages of 4 and 18, including those with support needs in Tiers 1-4.

The alternative provision provides one-to-one, one-to-two and small group bespoke tuition for children and young people who may be facing challenges in accessing education within a mainstream setting. There is a focus on English and Maths tuition, as well as opportunities to study History, Science, Coding, Creative Media, Business Studies, Sports, Art, RE and Geography, depending on the age of the learner and the programme of study.

Alongside a flexible, bespoke learning schedule, children and young people also have access to:

- Outdoor learning
- Mentoring support – Opportunities to explore SEMH and personal development.
- Life Skills and Personal Development – Exploring the local community, planning & cooking meals and budgeting

Staff are trained to work with children and young people with a range of special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), including dyslexia, Autism, ADHD and dyscalculia. Some of the tutors are also trained in Makaton and PECS.

Description of the Provision:

TCES National Online School offers a full curriculum delivered through therapeutic education and support to children and young people aged 7 to 25, who are unable to access education within an onsite school setting. This can be for a variety of reasons and can be linked to special educational needs and/or disabilities.

The school follows a therapeutic model of learning which places equal emphasis on academic, social, emotional, and personal development as measures of success. Integrated therapeutic support addresses the emotional and behavioural challenges often faced by students. This includes speech and language therapy, occupational therapy, and psychotherapy. Description of the Provision:

The Platform Project focus on enterprise, employability and personal development. They strive to engage and progress young people into education, work, or self-employment. They aim to equip disadvantaged and vulnerable young people to develop the skills, confidence and experience they need towards a thriving future. They deliver Alternative Provision (AP) and Early Intervention (EI) through the following programmes:

- **CONNECT:** a therapeutic 1:1 mentoring programme (CONNECT) pairs young people with Social, emotional and mental health (SEMH) needs that are preventing them from engaging effectively in mainstream education or putting them at risk of exclusion, marginalisation or youth offending with a therapeutically trained and supervised mentor, many of whom are qualified practicing counsellors. The 2-hour sessions are an alternative to a traditional therapy session - they go out in the community to do activities that the young person enjoys, building a trusting relationship and enabling them to open up and learn to regulate their emotions / behaviours.
- **ENGAGE:** a classroom alternative, which is a small group experiential programme where a maximum of 12 young people typically attend for 2-3 days per week as part of a part-time blended attendance package. Students are usually at risk of / have been excluded due to engagement, attendance or behaviour issues. The sessions use a range of practical projects that are modelled on workplace skills, such as enterprise, graphic design, upcycling, and life-skills etc, and they are taken through a Princes Trust Award in Employability & Personal Development. The students chose their projects every day based on their interests / abilities, providing a low-demand, flexible and engaging way for them to learn with a strengths-based approach.
- **DISCOVER:** is a personalised tutoring service, which supports students who have progressed inside the other programmes and are ready to re-start formal learning / catch up to transition back into school. Functional skills and GCSE tutoring is offered and delivered by fully qualified teachers who design learning activities to align with the students interests.
- **BOOST:** an employability programme for young people aged 16 to 24, akin to a supported internship / work experience placement for young people who have left education early (NEETS). A small group (max 12) spend 2.5 days per week working on practical projects related to career paths they are interested in to build their confidence, skills and CV experiences. They work with local employers and freelancers to learn about different jobs and skills, hear career talks, and do short work experience placements. They also work towards a Level 2 Princes Trust Award in Personal Development and Employability.

Description of the Provision:

TLC LIVE Online Tutoring offers bespoke, one-to-one tuition to children and young people aged between 5-16. The tutoring service specialise in many subject areas, including English, Maths, Science and Humanities. Each session is fully adaptable and can take place at a time that suits the child or young person, including evenings, weekends and holiday times. The sessions run between 7am and 10pm and are delivered online.

All of the tutors hold Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) to ensure the highest levels of teaching quality. The tutors have extensive experience in supporting children and young people with special educational needs (SEND) as well as those who are school refusers or those who are disengaged. If a student is referred for more than one subject, they will have at least one tutor per subject. Where possible and when timetabling allows, TLC LIVE will try to keep the number of tutors to a minimum.

TLC LIVE are able to support tiers 1-4 for Alternative Provision. Provision can be put in place for as long as is needed and there is not a minimum booking requirement.

While attending TLC LIVE, young people are supported throughout their GCSE years, including exam preparation, revision sessions and mocks. The service is an approved Functional Skills assessment centre and young people can sit both Level 1 and Level 2 Maths and English. There are also 33 ASDAN Short Courses on offer.

Once a referral form has been received, a TLC LIVE Online Tutoring Account Manager will meet with all relevant stakeholders to gain an understanding of the pupil's academic needs, current levels and desired outcomes. During the sessions, a personalised learning plan and timetable is tailored to fit the pupil's requirements. Suitable tutors are carefully assigned based on the pupil's subject needs and any specific preferences, such as tutor gender or teaching style. Additionally, a baseline assessment is conducted, either during or before the initial tutoring session, to evaluate the pupil's current academic performance. Regular follow-up assessments are conducted every 10 lessons or as needed to track progress and ensure that the learning plan remains effective. These assessments provide detailed data on the pupil's academic growth and allow for adjustments to be made as necessary. Furthermore, six-weekly review meetings with stakeholders offer an opportunity to discuss progress, attendance, and engagement strategies, ensuring that all parties remain aligned and proactive in supporting the pupil's development.

Staff have a range of qualifications, including HND, Model Making, City & Guilds, Level 3 Motor Vehicle, PTLLS, Level 3 Award in Education & Training

Individuals are referred into the service via schools, the Local Authority or by parents and carers. They can use the service for as long as they need, up until age 25. Young people usually use the service for 6 weeks – 2 years.

The service aims to support learners to increase their confidence and emotional resilience, while also promoting positive relationships with other members of the local community.

Description of the Provision:

CELLS aim to educate children and young people (CYP) about the serious consequences of crime and prevent initial and reoffending behaviours. They seek to support CYP who need guidance to cope with and overcome issues and barriers, to realize their full potential.

The factors that lead to involvement with crime are complex, deep-rooted and there is no single 'catch-all' solution. However, CELLS believe that by educating and supporting vulnerable young people in the community and helping them to realize their potential, we can help to prevent them from participating in crime and violence and consequently make the community safer for all.

They provide education on crime or direct one-on-one support to over 10,000 young people a year, and are dedicated to expanding their strategy so that, in the future, their methods can be incorporated into a national agenda.

CELLS facilitate interventions through operating five different and varied approaches:

- **CELLS Mentoring Support & Behavioural intervention:** CELLS mentors support young people with low, medium, or complex needs who face various personal and social issues.
- **Education and Awareness Programmes:** delivered to groups of CYP in schools and other community venues. Sessions are delivered by The-CELLS-Team and aim to inform CYP around issues related to themes such as criminal involvement, gangs, and exploitation, bullying and the criminal justice system.
- **Supported Respite Solutions:** activity-based respite for vulnerable young people, with a focus on those susceptible to exploitation. Respite within a rural location, primarily to LAC who are at risk or involved in criminal activities, with a primary focus on at-risk CYP susceptible to exploitation in county lines operations.
- **Outreach and Street Engagement:** offers a proactive way of engaging with CYP in their communities. It is targeted to areas experiencing social isolation, poverty, and youth related ASB.
- **KidsKast:** a podcast and media initiative made by the Kids for the Kids. An opportunity for youngsters to acquire production; filming; editing; and public speaking skills through interviews with guests of their choice. The project promotes community involvement among CYP from diverse backgrounds.
- **Lean on Me:** a support network for family members who are struggling with their child's behaviour or gang and exploitation and crime related issues.
- **Itsup2u:** initiative that offers positive development and rehabilitation. Supporting CYP, ex-offenders and people affected by crime and its related issues with positive training, inclusion, and employment routes, enhancing community cohesion and development.

Description of the Provision:

Rebel Training Group LTD provides a range of activities for children and young people aged between 4 and 21, including those with support needs in Tiers 1-4.

The Early Intervention Nurture Programme offers a bespoke support package tailored to the unique needs of each young person. Grounded in attachment theory and neuroscience, this nationally recognised intervention prioritises the emotional wellbeing and mental health of children, particularly those who have experienced trauma, neglect, or other adverse childhood experiences (ACEs).

The programme provides early help assessments and art-based nurture groups delivered as weekly, offsite school interventions. An assessment is undertaken, helping to identify and plan for learners' social, emotional, and behavioural needs. Strategies are then shared with schools to ensure effective inclusion and support within the classroom environment

Rebel Training Group LTD's Alternative Provision delivers high-quality instruction in core subjects (Maths, English and Science) alongside PSHE. Students can also benefit from Personalised Tuition Pathways, which align with the National Curriculum and are specifically tailored to meet the needs of students with SEND.

They have an Impact Hub that empowers students through Youth-Led Enterprise and Community Projects where students collaborate in a workplace-style environment, engaging in entrepreneurial and community initiatives. Additionally, they are supported in Supervised Volunteering Opportunities where students contribute to meaningful volunteer projects that support non-profit charities. Rein and Shine helps children and young people to connect to their communities through working with horses. They specialise in supporting children and young people who may be disengaged with education, those with additional special educational needs and those with Tier 4 support needs that may benefit from access to an alternative provision pathway.

The alternative provision service is based within an equine setting and works with children and young people to help them transition back into a school or college environment or to help prepare them for entering the world of work.

The staff that work at Rein and Shine are all qualified and experienced BHS Accredited Professional Coaches, while children and young people will also access support from specialist high and complex need teachers.

The programme makes links to the National Curriculum but focuses on promoting holistic development, to build relationships, communication, confidence, responsibility, teamwork and perseverance.

Outdoor learning, with the therapeutic benefit of horses, helps to create an environment in which children and young people can learn. The pathway is bespoke and can be fully adapted to suit the needs and interests of the child and young person.

Rein and Shine can offer British Horse Society Grooms Pathway qualifications, as well as Personal Development qualifications. Some young people have even gone on to take up apprenticeships with Rein and Shine.

Individuals can attend from age 8 to a post 16 pathway. Some children and young people attend once a week, others multiple days per week. There is minimum attendance of a term but individuals can use the service for as long as required. Sessions can be delivered on a 1:1 basis, 1:2 basis or in a small group.

Description of the Provision:

Swindon Mentoring and Self Help (SMASH) Project has over 25 years of experience delivering impactful, evidence-based services that support children and young people (CYP) re-engage with education and training in a psychologically safe, sustainable way, improving long term outcomes for the individual. SMASH offer a range of projects and services for individuals to engage with:

- **Wellbeing Mentoring** - provides one-to-one mentoring for CYP with emerging risks to their mental health and wellbeing.
- **Emotionally Based Schools Non-Attendance (EBSNA)** - offers personalised mentoring to 9 to 16-year-olds, to positively challenge and address barriers faced when accessing education. SMASH mentors will work alongside the young person, the home community, and the educational provision to foster solutions that work for the young person.
- **Transitions for Young People** - this takes a relational, peer-led approach to mentoring, encouraging Year 10 students to mentor Year 6s as they transition from primary into secondary school. This project aims to reduce the potential nerves and anxiety of Year 6s moving into secondary school, building their resilience to face new challenges. In return, the Year 10s are offered the opportunity of peer-based mentoring, enabling students to take the lead and develop their interpersonal and leadership skills.
- **Empower and Engage** - offers 1-to-1 mentoring to female students in Year 11 who are on a reduced timetable, enabling them to develop essential skills, explore career options, and adapt to the demands of college life. The project aims to create a structured and supportive environment for young women, providing a space where they can explore their options, develop ambitions and, hopefully, increase their engagement with education.
- **Hospital Youth Work**, in partnership with NHS and VCSE providers, supports CYP aged 11-25 with long term health conditions who frequently attend hospital and/or A&E to access the community and take control of their health and wellbeing.

SMASH also offers further services for communities and youth groups, which support young people to be an active part of their community, as well as empowering young people to explore the world of work and possible employment opportunities:



- **Solid Ground Coffee** - practical hub for young people with experience of serious violence to learn new skills and access the community. Situated on site outside the Swindon Borough Council Offices, young people will also be able to build relationships with key decision makers. This programme supports young people directly involved with Youth Justice to build their confidence, develop their employability skills and integrate into the community.
- **Transitioning out of the Care System** - working in partnership with CCLA and Wiltshire Community Foundation, this project supports young people who are transitioning out of the care system. Offering a long-term, tailored relationship, our mentors work 1-to-1 with young people across Wiltshire and Swindon, helping them navigate barriers into work and everyday life. Much like the Hospital project, our trauma-informed community-based mentors support young people to develop the skills and discover or realise their ambitions. This project works with young people aged 17 to 25 years.
- **Safer Relationships, Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG)** - a school based self-referral group mentoring program, empowering young women in education to discuss and recognise unsafe behaviours in friendships and relationships. Through a collaborative, female lead programme, students are encouraged to explore topics in a psychologically safe group environment. VAWG works with young women between the ages 11 to 16 in school, running 1.5 hour group sessions for a period of 12 weeks. Topics covered by the group are relative and appropriate to the age group they are working with.

STEP Swindon provides tailor-made 14-week therapeutic interventions for children and young people aged 7-18 years and up to 25 years for those children and young people who have special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), from across the Borough of Swindon.

Cohorts include children and young people who have considerable vulnerabilities, including sufferers of physical / emotional abuse and / or neglect, those in care, with mental health issues (including self-harm), have a diagnosis of a neurodiverse condition and are socially isolated due to either circumstance or behaviour.

Swindon Town FC Community Foundation offers weekly disability football sessions and multisport holiday camps for children and young people with Tier 1 support needs.

The programme aims to improve attainment while also developing social and communication skills. The multisport holiday camp provision provides children and young people with disabilities the opportunity to be active during the school holidays while also offering respite to the carers.

Sessions are run in smaller groups with a coach to child ratio of a maximum of 1:4.

Individuals can be referred for tuition sessions with Swindon Tuition Centre privately by parents and carers, through the Local council or by the on roll school. Swindon Mentoring and Self Help (SMASH) Project has over 25 years of experience delivering impactful, evidence-based services that support children and young people (CYP) re-engage with education and training in a psychologically safe, sustainable way, improving long term outcomes for the individual. SMASH offer a range of projects and services for individuals to engage with:

- **Wellbeing Mentoring** - provides one-to-one mentoring for CYP with emerging risks to their mental health and wellbeing.
- **Emotionally Based Schools Non-Attendance (EBSNA)** - offers personalised mentoring to 9 to 16-year-olds, to positively challenge and address barriers faced when accessing education. SMASH mentors will work alongside the young person, the home community, and the educational provision to foster solutions that work for the young person.
- **Transitions for Young People** - this takes a relational, peer-led approach to mentoring, encouraging Year 10 students to mentor Year 6s as they transition from primary into secondary school. This project aims to reduce the potential nerves and anxiety of Year 6s moving into secondary school, building their resilience to face new challenges. In return, the Year 10s are offered the opportunity of peer-based mentoring, enabling students to take the lead and develop their interpersonal and leadership skills.
- **Empower and Engage** - offers 1-to-1 mentoring to female students in Year 11 who are on a reduced timetable, enabling them to develop essential skills, explore career options, and adapt to the demands of college life. The project aims to create a structured and supportive environment for young women, providing a space where they can explore their options, develop ambitions and, hopefully, increase their engagement with education.
- **Hospital Youth Work**, in partnership with NHS and VCSE providers, supports CYP aged 11-25 with long term health conditions who frequently attend hospital and/or A&E to access the community and take control of their health and wellbeing.

This programme supports young people directly involved with Youth Justice to build their confidence, develop their employability skills and integrate into the community.

VAWG works with young women between the ages 11 to 16 in school, running 1.5 hour group sessions for a period of 12 weeks. Topics covered by the group are relative and appropriate to the age group they are working with.

There is a focus on English and Maths tuition, as well as opportunities to study History, Science, Coding, Creative Media, Business Studies, Sports, Art, RE and Geography, depending on the age of the learner and the programme of study.

Alongside a flexible, bespoke learning schedule, children and young people also have access to:

- Outdoor learning
- Mentoring support – Opportunities to explore SEMH and personal development.
- Life Skills and Personal Development – Exploring the local community, planning & cooking meals and budgeting
- Work Experience and Employability
- PSHE

Staff are trained to work with children and young people with a range of special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), including dyslexia, Autism, ADHD and dyscalculia. Some of the tutors are also trained in Makaton and PECS.

Individuals can be referred for tuition sessions with Swindon Tuition Centre privately by parents and carers, through the Local council or by the on roll school. We are contactable via email, phone call or via our online referral form found on our website - <https://www.swindontuitioncentre.co.uk/alternative-provision-1>.

We can provide support for students to sit exams through their on-roll school but at our centre as a more suitable environment for the individual. We also use AQA Unit Award Scheme as certification for achievements.

Individuals can remain with Swindon Tuition as part of a gradual reintroduction to their school placements or for longer term if this is suitable to meet their needs and long-term targets. We have had students utilising our service for a number of years due to this being a more suitable setting and supporting them to successfully complete their qualifications.

The Big Adventure Club provides a holiday club for children and young people with support needs in Tiers 1-4. The service aims to provide a learning environment that is inviting and nurturing and is inclusive for all.

The service is child-led, meaning that children and young people can explore, learn and have fun while making their own choices. Some of the activities on offer for children and young people includes: sports, table top games, consoles, a quiet area, a construction area, arts and crafts, a disco room and an outdoor area.

Some staff currently work in schools as 1-1 teaching assistants and all managers hold SEND training. The Big Adventure Club ask staff to do online training which includes SEND and Autism as part of their annual training.

Parents or carers usually book onto the programme through the HAF page and then follow up with an email to discuss their child or young person's needs. The Big Adventure Club are unable to take children in nappies as they do not have changing facilities.

We have been providing childcare in Swindon for 33 years, we have always been awarded a minimum good or Met by Ofsted on every inspection. We are a large childcare company that provides childcare for in excess of 4500 children across Swindon.

Our experience with providing childcare is that we are continually evolving and learning and working to improve on all aspects of care that we provide, at present we have 6 morning clubs, 14 after school clubs and 3 holiday clubs with a minimum 250 children in attendance every day during term time, this number can then rise during the school holiday periods.

Description of the Provision:

CELLS aim to educate children and young people (CYP) about the serious consequences of crime and prevent initial and reoffending behaviours. They seek to support CYP who need guidance to cope with and overcome issues and barriers, to realize their full potential.

The factors that lead to involvement with crime are complex, deep-rooted and there is no single 'catch-all' solution. However, CELLS believe that by educating and supporting vulnerable young people in the community and helping them to realize their potential, we can help to prevent them from participating in crime and violence and consequently make the community safer for all.

They provide education on crime or direct one-on-one support to over 10,000 young people a year, and are dedicated to expanding their strategy so that, in the future, their methods can be incorporated into a national agenda.

CELLS facilitate interventions through operating five different and varied approaches:

- **CELLS Mentoring Support & Behavioural intervention:** CELLS mentors support young people with low, medium, or complex needs who face various personal and social issues.
- **Education and Awareness Programmes:** delivered to groups of CYP in schools and other community venues. Sessions are delivered by The-CELLS-Team and aim to inform CYP around issues related to themes such as criminal involvement, gangs, and exploitation, bullying and the criminal justice system.
- **Supported Respite Solutions:** activity-based respite for vulnerable young people, with a focus on those susceptible to exploitation. Respite within a rural location, primarily to LAC who are at risk or involved in criminal activities, with a primary focus on at-risk CYP susceptible to exploitation in county lines operations.
- **Outreach and Street Engagement:** offers a proactive way of engaging with CYP in their communities. It is targeted to areas experiencing social isolation, poverty, and youth related ASB.
- **KidsKast:** a podcast and media initiative made by the Kids for the Kids. An opportunity for youngsters to acquire production; filming; editing; and public speaking skills through interviews with guests of their choice. The project promotes community involvement among CYP from diverse backgrounds.
- **Lean on Me:** a support network for family members who are struggling with their child's behaviour or gang and exploitation and crime related issues.



- **Itsup2u:** initiative that offers positive development and rehabilitation. Supporting CYP, ex-offenders and people affected by crime and its related issues with positive training, inclusion, and employment routes, enhancing community cohesion and development.

Description of the Provision:

Oxenwood Outdoor Education Centre and Linkenholt Countryside Adventure Centre supports children and young people from all backgrounds, including those who struggle to access mainstream education and those who find maintaining social relationships challenging. They work with individuals with support needs in Tiers 1-3 and each session can be delivered in a 1:1 or small group setting.

Children are encouraged to connect with nature and embark on a range of adventures to help them develop their confidence, resilience, independence and motivation. The curriculum focuses on children and young people's social, emotional and physical development.

Some of the activities that children and young people can participate in, include:

- Bush Craft and Survival, such as emergency survival skills, shelter building, navigation, campfire cooking, water purification and basic emergency first aid.
- Discover History, such as Stone Age Life, Ancient Britons, Knights & Castles and Romans, Saxons & Vikings.
- Outdoor Adventurer, such as climbing, mountain biking and hiking & navigation.

Each of these sessions encourage physical activity and social interaction by supporting children and young people to overcome their fears and face challenges with confidence. The service encourages the children and young people to think about the nature around them to develop their environmental awareness skills.

Family Group Conference works with families and friends to find solutions to address family and professional concerns. They work with families at all stages, from early intervention to all levels of social care involvement. The specialist team are dedicated to empowering families to stay together and come up with solutions on how to do this, ensuring that it is safe for everybody involved.

Children and young people are normally involved in their own family group conference, although they are often supported by an advocate. An independent Family Group Conference coordinator will prepare the family for their meeting and explore support from extended family members and friends.

During the meeting, which can be held in person or online, professionals set out their concerns and offer advice on what support could be available. Family members then have private family time to make a safe plan for the child. The family will also have the opportunity to attend a further meeting 3 months later to review their plan.

Family Group Conference also offers Restorative Conference. This is a process that brings people together and allows them to discuss difficulties within the relationships that are having an impact on them and their children. The focus is on the future and reaching agreements that support healthier relationships by making a plan for change. The theory behind this style of mediation is that a person can dispute facts, but they cannot dispute how something has made someone feel. Emphasis is around listening, in the hope that this can provide answers as to why a person has acted the way they have.

Staff have a range of skills and experience to support the families that they work with. They work flexibly to meet the needs of families and professionals, ensuring that meetings run on a date and time that is suitable for all.

Family Group Conference is a voluntary process and families must consent to a referral. Families are referred into a service through a professional body, such as through the Local Authority. Individuals are unable to self-refer.

Description of the Provision:

IProveFit provides one-to-one, small and large group trauma-informed and evidence-based mentoring to children and young people with support needs in Tiers 1-4.

They work with children and young people to boost their self-worth and to help them recognise their own achievements. They model positive behaviours, collaborate with young people to overcome barriers and emphasise a healthy lifestyle for both the body and the mind. Individuals access the service for a minimum of 12 weeks but each child or young person is assessed on an individual basis.

The mentors at IProveFit use their own experiences to help the children and young people working with them. Each activity is bespoke and personalised to suit the individual's needs. Individuals are referred into the service by their schools, through the Local Authority or from a private referral.

IProveFit applies a series of Mentoring Approaches:

- One-to-one mentoring: Mentors provide guidance by sharing knowledge and developmental advice to help young people achieve their goals.
- Small Group Mentoring: Groups of young people with similar goals or challenges receive support by fostering communication and teamwork.
- Flash Mentoring/Crisis Mentoring: Short-term mentoring addressing specific, immediate needs or issues.
- Virtual Mentoring: One-to-one sessions conducted virtually through TEAMS, eliminating location restrictions.
- Team Mentoring: Multiple mentors work with the same individual to provide diverse perspectives and meet various needs.
- Insight Mentoring: Both mentor and young person learn from each other, sharing input and respecting each other's experiences. This keeps ideas fresh and relevant, addressing current themes and trends.

Alongside supporting the holistic needs of the individual, IProveFit also offers numeracy and literary tuition, as well as GCSE core subject input, for up to three hours per subject per week, depending on the needs of the child or young person. Young people can achieve a Leadership Level 1 award and Personal Training qualifications.

Staff have a range of qualifications to support the children and young people that they work with, including Safeguarding, Prevent, Autism Awareness, First Aid at Work, and Mental Health First Aid.

Description of the Provision:

Launch2Learning is an academic alternative provision that works with children and young people with Tiers 2 and 3 support needs to fill any gaps that they may have. With a focus on student's emotional and social wellbeing, Launch2Learning aims to build resilience, increase confidence and improve overall attitude towards learning.

Group sizes are small, up to a maximum of 8 students per class, meaning that each session is bespoke and adapted to suit the individual needs of learners. All students are supported on a one-to-one basis with a teacher/ mentor and individual packages are offered to ensure progress is made at the learner's own pace. Sessions are in-person but online sessions can be offered initially.

Launch2Learning offers support for GCSEs and is a registered exam centre for Functional Skills tests. They also offer AQA Unit Awards, SWEET programmes and bespoke post-16 packages. Although each package of learning is bespoke, most students are offered a combination of Literacy, Numeracy, Cooking, SWEET, career pilot and PSHE, while also being exposed to content in the National Curriculum for their age.

Launch2Learning aims to support the successful transition back to full time education at a learner's own school or help with the transition to a specialist provision. Launch2Learning can also support young people on an EOTAS/ EOTIS package, depending on their desired learning outcomes. Individuals can use the service for as long as is needed and are referred into it by their school, college or the Local Authority.

Staff have a range of qualifications, which helps them to support children and young people's learning. All staff receive training in Safeguarding, Prevent, FGM, Fire Safety, Keeping Children Safe in Education and Sexual Harassment.

New Beginnings is a voluntary service offered to women, and their partners, in Swindon who have had at least one child removed from their care. The service also supports women in pregnancy, and their partners, where there is a risk that the baby will be removed from their parents care. New Beginnings supports and empowers women to identify, make and sustain positive changes to their lives. The aim is to build a sense of self-worth, esteem and value in women whose life experiences may have prevented this and resulted in a spiral of self-harm and or destruction.

Referrals to New Beginnings are made by a professional who is, or has worked, with the individual prior to, at the time of or after the child is removed. New Beginnings can also accept referrals from professionals who work with women who are pregnant and fathers. They cannot accept referrals for parents who have children in their care or who live outside of Swindon.

New Beginnings workers tailor the programme to meet individual needs. Each woman (and her partner) is allocated a New Beginnings worker who will work with them for up to 18 months, depending on their level of need. The work involves building a mutually trusting, respectful and honest relationship, which is a partnership and led by the aspirations of the individual. The worker will meet regularly with the woman and her partner as often as needed, both as a couple and separately if appropriate.

Some key themes that New Beginnings focus on include: Domestic Abuse, Housing, Debt and Money Management, Education and Employment, Healthy Relationships, Addressing Alcohol and Substance Misuse, Accessing Support, Counselling or Therapy, Promoting Good Holistic Health – physical, emotional and sexual.

Description of the Provision:

The Swindon School Nursing Service is committed to supporting all school-aged children and young people, helping them to reach their full potential regardless of their health and wellbeing needs or challenges. The team is composed of Specialist Community Public Health Nurses (holding Post Graduate Qualifications and registered with the Nursing & Midwifery Council), Registered Nurses (also NMC-registered), and School Health Screeners. With extensive experience and ongoing professional development, the team is well-positioned to collaborate with children, young people, and their families to address their health needs.

The primary approach includes:

- Empowering children and young people to build resilience and adopt healthy lifestyles
- Promoting positive health behaviours and reducing risk-taking
- Offering confidential, tailored advice and support
- Assisting vulnerable individuals and addressing health inequalities
- Collaborating with families, educators, and professionals to prioritise health needs and ensure appropriate support
- Addressing complex and additional health needs
- Encouraging self-care and independence

Additionally, all schools in Swindon are offered virtual School Staff Medical Awareness sessions to enhance understanding of how to manage severe allergies, epilepsy, and asthma. The school nursing service also provides healthcare plans for Epilepsy and Severe Allergies following a referral.

The service undertakes health assessments for Children Looked After, as well as other vulnerable children and young people. Common areas of support include continence, healthy weight management, and sleep.

In secondary schools, a named school nurse provides a weekly confidential clinic, offering support on a wide range of health topics, including Mental, Physical, Sexual, and Emotional Health. School nurses regularly collaborate with school staff to strengthen information sharing and identify health support needs. Primary schools have access to the National Child Measurement Programme (NCMP) for children in Reception and Year 6, as well as vision screening for Reception-aged children.

School nurses adopt a flexible approach to service delivery, ensuring that the voice of the child or young person is central. Support may be provided through 1:1 sessions, group work, or virtual consultations, tailored to meet the specific needs of each individual.



The School Nursing Service welcomes referrals from anyone, whether that be school, other professionals, families or the child or young person themselves.

The HAF Programme (Primary and Secondary) addresses a gap in services for secondary-aged students in Swindon, promoting health and wellbeing for children and young people aged 4–16. The programme focuses on fostering positive mental health and emotional wellbeing through a wide range of activities, including yoga, mindfulness, therapeutic art, creative projects, youth-led drama, dance, and wellbeing initiatives. By celebrating diversity and culture, students not only gain new skills but also build meaningful friendships.

The curriculum is designed to promote student’s strengths and interests to build their self-esteem and confidence. Description of the Provision:

Swindon Mentoring and Self Help (SMASH) Project has over 25 years of experience delivering impactful, evidence-based services that support children and young people (CYP) re-engage with education and training in a psychologically safe, sustainable way, improving long term outcomes for the individual. SMASH offer a range of projects and services for individuals to engage with:

- **Wellbeing Mentoring** - provides one-to-one mentoring for CYP with emerging risks to their mental health and wellbeing.
- **Emotionally Based Schools Non-Attendance (EBSNA)** - offers personalised mentoring to 9 to 16-year-olds, to positively challenge and address barriers faced when accessing education. SMASH mentors will work alongside the young person, the home community, and the educational provision to foster solutions that work for the young person.
- **Transitions for Young People** - this takes a relational, peer-led approach to mentoring, encouraging Year 10 students to mentor Year 6s as they transition from primary into secondary school. This project aims to reduce the potential nerves and anxiety of Year 6s moving into secondary school, building their resilience to face new challenges. - **Empower and Engage** - offers 1-to-1 mentoring to female students in Year 11 who are on a reduced timetable, enabling them to develop essential skills, explore career options, and adapt to the demands of college life. The project aims to create a structured and supportive environment for young women, providing a space where they can explore their options, develop ambitions and, hopefully, increase their engagement with education.
- **Hospital Youth Work**, in partnership with NHS and VCSE providers, supports CYP aged 11-25 with long term health conditions who frequently attend hospital and/or A&E to access the community and take control of their health and wellbeing.

SMASH also offers further services for communities and youth groups, which support young people to be an active part of their community, as well as empowering young people to explore the world of work and possible employment opportunities:

- **Solid Ground Coffee** - practical hub for young people with experience of serious violence to learn new skills and access the community. Situated on site outside the Swindon Borough Council Offices, young people will also be able to build relationships with key decision makers. This programme supports young people directly



involved with Youth Justice to build their confidence, develop their employability skills and integrate into the community.

- **Transitioning out of the Care System** - working in partnership with CCLA and Wiltshire Community Foundation, this project supports young people who are transitioning out of the care system. Offering a long-term, tailored relationship, our mentors work 1-to-1 with young people across Wiltshire and Swindon, helping them navigate barriers into work and everyday life. Much like the Hospital project, our trauma-informed community-based mentors support young people to develop the skills and discover or realise their ambitions. This project works with young people aged 17 to 25 years.
- **Safer Relationships, Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG)** - a school based self-referral group mentoring program, empowering young women in education to discuss and recognise unsafe behaviours in friendships and relationships. Through a collaborative, female lead programme, students are encouraged to explore topics in a psychologically safe group environment. VAWG works with young women between the ages 11 to 16 in school, running 1.5 hour group sessions for a period of 12 weeks. Topics covered by the group are relative and appropriate to the age group they are working with.

Sounds Like Women CIC provides music therapy and therapeutic sessions for children and young people from a range of backgrounds, including those with Tier 1-4 support needs.

Children and young people accessing the service can either receive support within their own homes, at a chosen venue or at The Baker's Café in Swindon, where group sessions are delivered on a weekly basis. Online music therapy services can also be offered to individuals who are unable to attend an in-person session. Sessions can be delivered on a 1:1 basis or in a small group, depending on the needs of the individual.

Description of the Provision:

STEP Swindon provides tailor-made 14-week therapeutic interventions for children and young people aged 7-18 years and up to 25 years for those children and young people who have special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), from across the Borough of Swindon.

Cohorts include children and young people who have considerable vulnerabilities, including sufferers of physical / emotional abuse and / or neglect, those in care, with mental health issues (including self-harm), have a diagnosis of a neurodiverse condition and are socially isolated due to either circumstance or behaviour.

The programmes are delivered by trained therapeutic group workers, supported by adult volunteers and peer mentors. Session content is defined by the collective needs identified for those attending and they create bespoke session plans and resources to support the intervention programmes. Project staff work with young people, their families and referrers to tailor-make the sessions, to meet current needs, and therefore, content and delivery is constantly evolving.

All young people are referred into the service by health, education or social care professionals using recognised statutory assessment forms – Early Help Records and Educational Health Care Plans – for targeted and specific work. They have a comprehensive assessment process in place and appropriate allocation to groups is based on needs identified at point of referral, alongside face to face assessment within the first 2 weeks of intervention.

Description of the Provision:

Stride360 provides bespoke pastoral support to schools and students through one-to-one, group, and after-school mentoring sessions. Each programme is tailored to meet the unique needs and interests of the individuals involved, ensuring a personalised and impactful approach. Stride360 works with children and young people from diverse backgrounds, including those requiring support within Tiers 1-4. To promote inclusivity, sessions can take place on-site or off-site, accommodating the needs of the child, their family, and the school. Additionally, Stride360 offers flexible in-school support, enabling multiple students to be supported in a day while also addressing behaviour during breaks and transitions. The Stride Approach is a comprehensive framework designed to support the holistic development of children and young people. It focuses on six key areas:

- Education: Re-engaging young people in the importance of education and fostering a love for learning.
- Healthy Lifestyle: Encouraging regular exercise and a balanced diet to support physical well-being.
- Mental Health: Developing positive coping strategies and fostering a growth mindset.
- Life Skills: Building independence, effective communication, and problem-solving abilities.
- Social Skills: Enhancing conflict resolution skills and promoting respect for others.
- Self-Control: Supporting emotional regulation and managing stress and anxiety effectively.

Central to the Stride Approach is the development of strong, trusting relationships between mentors and mentees. By creating a safe and supportive environment, Stride360 empowers children and young people to explore their interests, address challenges, and express their emotions constructively.

Stride360 has recently announced the launch of its Alternative Provision, initially offering 10 places for children and young people. This service is designed for those not currently in full-time education or struggling to engage in their existing school placements. The Alternative Provision integrates the six key areas of the Stride Approach while rebuilding trust and positive relationships with education. During their time at the Alternative Provision, students will have access to:

- A core curriculum focused on literacy, numeracy, and reading.
- Accredited qualifications such as ASDAN or Duke of Edinburgh (age-dependent).
- Work experience opportunities (age-dependent).
- Life and soft skills embedded into every aspect of the curriculum.



- Tailored support, including Therapeutic Mentoring, Mentoring, or ELSA interventions, based on individual needs.
- Opportunities to work on personal goals and developmental milestones.
- Subject-specific work provided by their main school placement.
- Activities to rebuild relationships with their main school or a potential new placement.
- Continued mentoring support after their placement ends.
- Transport to and from the location.
- Nutritious lunches aligned with a healthy lifestyle.

The Alternative Provision aims to provide a nurturing environment where students can rediscover their confidence, develop essential skills, and achieve meaningful progress in their educational journey. Stride360 remains committed to fostering positive change in the lives of children and young people, empowering them to overcome challenges and reach their full potential.

A qualified designated safeguarding lead and a qualified Teacher will also be appointed to write, review and deliver the curriculum.

Individuals can be referred by Schools, Local Authority and by Parents. Referrals can be made via the website or by email.

Students can access 1:1 mentoring, group mentoring and onsite support for a minimum of 12 weeks. For the Alternative Provision students will be placed with us for 12 weeks with the intention of re-integrating them into their main school placement. Placements will be reviewed every 12 weeks with the school or council to decide if the placement continues. There is no cap on the length of time a student can spend at the Alternative Provision.

Description of the Provision:

Swindon Domestic Abuse Support Service (Swindon Women's Aid) offers outreach support through one-to-one sessions or group programmes for children and young people who have experienced Domestic Abuse. The service supports children and young people from a range of backgrounds, including those with support needs in Tiers 2-4.

Sessions predominantly take place in the child or young person's school, but the service can be flexible to suit the needs of the individual. Sessions are delivered face to face as Swindon Domestic Abuse Support Service (Swindon Women's Aid) believe this has greater impact for the children and young people. The programmes also offer education on healthy relationships.

Referrals are welcomed from all statutory and voluntary agencies through the referral form which can be found on the website. Parents are also able to refer their child to the service using the same referral form.

The programmes run for approximately 10-12 weeks. The 1-1 sessions are delivered based on need so the timeframe will vary. Service users can expect to receive at least 12 weeks of support from their CYP outreach worker.

The CYP outreach workers hold various qualifications which relate to working with children and young people. They also have a plethora of training within the field of domestic abuse, mental health and trauma informed practice.

Description of the Provision:

The Swindon Early Years Centre supports young children under 5 with Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities (SEND) and their families. The service does this through:

- Special Tots Groups (Ofsted registered Early Years setting for children aged 2 -5. Sessions are 3 hours long - 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. every day except Wednesday afternoons).
- Portage Home visiting (for children with identified complex needs).
- Offering specific support related to the child's needs, for example completion of DLA forms, Early Help and Support Records, specific and/or time limited pieces of work.
- Signposting parents to other services, offering advice and support and helping families to navigate the SEND system.
- The EarlyBird programme, for parents of children under 5 at the start of the program who have a diagnosis of autism or who have been accepted on to the Neurodevelopmental Conditions (NDC) pathway .

The service works in close partnership with parents using the Portage model and parents usually stay on site for at least one of their child's sessions.

Swindon Early Years Centre follows the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum but adapts tasks to engage and enthuse learners based on their individual needs and interests. They usually expect children to also be in a mainstream setting and work closely with that setting to support good outcomes for children.

Staff, counted in ratio, have a minimum of level 3 Ofsted recognised qualifications. Senior staff are usually degree educated. The service also uses unqualified staff who support the trained staff and may be working towards their Early Years childcare qualifications.

Parents may refer their children directly into the service or may be referred by a professional.

Children stay with the service until they start school unless their needs are better met entirely in mainstream provision.

Group sessions accommodate up to 8 children. The service also offers portage at home, which is working alongside parents to support their children's development. This service is for children (usually under 2 years of age) with the most complex needs. Children will often transfer into one of the Special Tot (group sessions) once they receive their Early Years entitlement.

Description of the Provision:

Swindon Tuition Centre provides alternative provision and HAF support for children and young people between the ages of 4 and 18, including those with support needs in Tiers 1-4.

The alternative provision provides one-to-one, one-to-two and small group bespoke tuition for children and young people who may be facing challenges in accessing education within a mainstream setting. There is a focus on English and Maths tuition, as well as opportunities to study History, Science, Coding, Creative Media, Business Studies, Sports, Art, RE and Geography, depending on the age of the learner and the programme of study.

Alongside a flexible, bespoke learning schedule, children and young people also have access to:

- Outdoor learning
- Mentoring support – Opportunities to explore SEMH and personal development.
- Life Skills and Personal Development – Exploring the local community, planning & cooking meals and budgeting
- Work Experience and Employability
- PSHE

Staff are trained to work with children and young people with a range of special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), including dyslexia, Autism, ADHD and dyscalculia. Some of the tutors are also trained in Makaton and PECS.

Individuals can be referred for tuition sessions with Swindon Tuition Centre privately by parents and carers, through the Local council or by the on roll school. We are contactable via email, phone call or via our online referral form found on our website - <https://www.swindontuitioncentre.co.uk/alternative-provision-1>.

We can provide support for students to sit exams through their on-roll school but at our centre as a more suitable environment for the individual. We also use AQA Unit Award Scheme as certification for achievements.

Description of the Provision:

The Platform Project focus on enterprise, employability and personal development. They strive to engage and progress young people into education, work, or self-employment. They aim to equip disadvantaged and vulnerable young people to develop the skills, confidence and experience they need towards a thriving future. They deliver Alternative Provision (AP) and Early Intervention (EI) through the following programmes:

- **CONNECT:** a therapeutic 1:1 mentoring programme (CONNECT) pairs young people with Social, emotional and mental health (SEMH) needs that are preventing them from engaging effectively in mainstream education or putting them at risk of exclusion, marginalisation or youth offending with a therapeutically trained and supervised mentor, many of whom are qualified practicing counsellors. The 2-hour sessions are an alternative to a traditional therapy session - they go out in the community to do activities that the young person enjoys, building a trusting relationship and enabling them to open up and learn to regulate their emotions / behaviours.
- **ENGAGE:** a classroom alternative, which is a small group experiential programme where a maximum of 12 young people typically attend for 2-3 days per week as part of a part-time blended attendance package. Students are usually at risk of / have been excluded due to engagement, attendance or behaviour issues. The sessions use a range of practical projects that are modelled on workplace skills, such as enterprise, graphic design, upcycling, and life-skills etc, and they are taken through a Princes Trust Award in Employability & Personal Development. The students chose their projects every day based on their interests / abilities, providing a low-demand, flexible and engaging way for them to learn with a strengths-based approach.
- **DISCOVER:** is a personalised tutoring service, which supports students who have progressed inside the other programmes and are ready to re-start formal learning / catch up to transition back into school. Functional skills and GCSE tutoring is offered and delivered by fully qualified teachers who design learning activities to align with the students interests.
- **BOOST:** an employability programme for young people aged 16 to 24, akin to a supported internship / work experience placement for young people who have left education early (NEETS). A small group (max 12) spend 2.5 days per week working on practical projects related to career paths they are interested in to build their confidence, skills and CV experiences. They work with local employers and freelancers to learn about different jobs and skills, hear career talks, and do short work experience placements. They also work towards a Level 2 Princes Trust Award in Personal Development and Employability.

Description of the Provision:

TLC LIVE Online Tutoring offers bespoke, one-to-one tuition to children and young people aged between 5-16. The tutoring service specialise in many subject areas, including English, Maths, Science and Humanities. Each session is fully adaptable and can take place at a time that suits the child or young person, including evenings, weekends and holiday times. The sessions run between 7am and 10pm and are delivered online.

All of the tutors hold Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) to ensure the highest levels of teaching quality. The tutors have extensive experience in supporting children and young people with special educational needs (SEND) as well as those who are school refusers or those who are disengaged. If a student is referred for more than one subject, they will have at least one tutor per subject. Where possible and when timetabling allows, TLC LIVE will try to keep the number of tutors to a minimum.

TLC LIVE are able to support tiers 1-4 for Alternative Provision. Provision can be put in place for as long as is needed and there is not a minimum booking requirement.

While attending TLC LIVE, young people are supported throughout their GCSE years, including exam preparation, revision sessions and mocks. The service is an approved Functional Skills assessment centre and young people can sit both Level 1 and Level 2 Maths and English. There are also 33 ASDAN Short Courses on offer.

Once a referral form has been received, a TLC LIVE Online Tutoring Account Manager will meet with all relevant stakeholders to gain an understanding of the pupil's academic needs, current levels and desired outcomes. During the sessions, a personalised learning plan and timetable is tailored to fit the pupil's requirements. Suitable tutors are carefully assigned based on the pupil's subject needs and any specific preferences, such as tutor gender or teaching style. Additionally, a baseline assessment is conducted, either during or before the initial tutoring session, to evaluate the pupil's current academic performance. Regular follow-up assessments are conducted every 10 lessons or as needed to track progress and ensure that the learning plan remains effective. These assessments provide detailed data on the pupil's academic growth and allow for adjustments to be made as necessary. Furthermore, six-weekly review meetings with stakeholders offer an opportunity to discuss progress, attendance, and engagement strategies, ensuring that all parties remain aligned and proactive in supporting the pupil's development.

Description of the Provision:

Youth Service Better Gym supports young people who have experienced adverse childhood experiences, those using substances or those with other specific needs. The service aims to be accessible and inclusive, working with children and young people with Tier 2 support needs. The young people also have access to other facilities such as swimming.

The programme gives children and young people access to any Better Gym in Swindon with a Youth Service Gym Membership. The service works with children and young people aged between 14-17 due to health and safety regulations linked to using gym equipment. The children are supported by gym staff during their induction, however, it is independent from there on in.

Children and Young People who are working with professionals at a Tier 2 level of need can be referred in for a Youth Service Gym Membership and will need the following details in order to process the referral:

- Young Person's Full Name
- Contact e mail address (Young Person or parent/carer) - Email address is vital as that is how the children book the online sessions and how the gym send confirmation of their membership through.
- Young Person's Address
- Young Person's Date of Birth
- Telephone number (Young Person or parent/carer)

Once the membership number has been sent through email, the young people will have 6 months until expiry, however, if they are over 17 years and 6 months, the membership will expire once they turn 18.
